FROM THE OFFICE DOWN THE HALL Gary Burdette; Assistant Superintendent

Part of the enjoyment we obtain from our interest in the hobby of model railroading is the fact that there are so many prototypical and historical aspects related to it. We may choose to study the people of an area or era. The development of the railroad and industry are worthy of our attention. Civil War buffs may look into the ramifications of the conflict in various states in relation to the railroad. One example is the Battle of Phillipi, West Virginia. General McClellan had amassed 10,000 troops south of Grafton at Webster (The childhood home of Anna Jarvis, the founder of Mother's Day, was used as his headquarters) in order to be nearby to protect the B&O line at this important locale. Thus, the first land battle was fought there a the Confederates attempted to capture the line. The list goes on.

Related to these studies may be the obtainment and preservation of pictures and artifacts. The NMRA has its library and the Chesapeake and Ohio Historical Society (of which I am a member) has its archives. Both (among many other organizations) have a variety of valuable assets representing important glimpses into the past. We borrow and study these collections for our own enjoyment and entertainment and to increase our knowledge. Sometimes we may acquire our own bits of memorabilia.

Several years ago I obtained some interesting photos. Though they are a little worn, they document history. The first shows two views of a GMC tanker lettered for the Ohio Department of Highways. The bicycle wheel on the side may indicate it was used to paint or spray something at intervals. The large engine and pump on the rear most certainly disperses some form of liquid. The second item is an old B&C flat. At first I thought it was a B&O, but under magnification, I saw an unfamiliar reporting mark _& Charleston?). Stenciling on the side notes it was built 1-06. It lists M-W-S-WT 1-29. Other information includes YOKE ATTACHMENT, COUPLER SHAFT 5x7, METAL BRAKE BEAM, and FRICTION DRAFT GEAR. On the back written in pencil is the inscription "getting out the Charleston job E L. Smith Quairir." These are two interesting documents, to say the least.

I am passing these along to my fellow Division 9 members as a way of preserving them through you by sharing them with you. Perhaps, someone knows more about these two pieces of equipment. Both could make nice additions to an era appropriate model railroad. I encourage you to notify our editor if you have anything you can add to the discussion. Share and we learn.

NEWS FROM NATIONAL NMRA INFONET

The Board and officers are already preparing for the upcoming Winter Board of Directors meeting by preparing a list of topics to bring up for discussion. As we mentioned last month, the winter Board Meeting is being held concurrently with the Budget and Operations meetings this year in Las Vegas at the Palace Station Hotel (about 5 miles from the airport). The Budget and Operations meetings, which are by invitation only, begin on Tuesday, February 22 at 9 a.m. The Board Meeting runs from 9 to 5 (or later) on Wednesday, February 23, and 9 to 5 (or later) on Thursday, February 24. All NMRA members are welcome to attend.

If you recall, the Union Pacific sponsored a photo contest last summer. Entrants were asked to model and then photograph a UP scene. The grand prize was a daylong ride in the cab of a UP steamer. The winner, who was chosen from the over-100 photographs entered, was Harlan "Buzz" Lenander. Buzz had his day in the cab on October 4 on a fantrip that started in the Kansas City (Missouri) Union Station and ended at the old Missouri Pacific Depot in Jefferson City, Missouri. DISCOVERING ITEMS FROM THE PAST By Gary J. Burdette Photo by the author

In my assistant superintendent's column this month I have presented a couple photos from the past that I stumbled upon at an old antique store. While the truck and flat car shown are probably long gone, there may be similar items still around that document the past in three-dimensional form and are worthy of being photographed, measured, and documented. Such an example was an old Chevy flat-bed truck with a drilling rig attached that I happened to see in a yard by the road along the old B&O Ohio River Line at Letart, West Virginia. The old rig is not a common sight, is somewhat historic, and begs to be modeled. When I saw it, I knew it was the perfect "Larry Richards project," as he is a master of HO vehicles with many highly detailed and modified models to his credit.

I have an old truck that matched this one (a detailed toy of unknown brand), though any make, including the U.S.Army six-by, would be fine as the basis for building the model because the engine, supports, pulleys, and frame were placed upon many different types of truck. Once you find the appropriate vehicle, you must gather your scratch-building items. I selected sections of small Evergreen angle iron and channel stock. The motor and radiator from a Jordan Products tractor would really match the prototype, with a couple of Grandt



Line pulleys you're in business. I used the truck model and photographs to prepare a rough scale drawing in hopes of getting things in the proper proportions. I did not crawl around on the thing getting measurements since it was in a fellow's front yard. Close will have to do here. It is not finished, so the prototype shots will have to inspire and direct you in your modeling efforts, for now.

Thus, here is a brief look at something you can still find from the past, photograph, and model....if you keep your eyes open and are lucky enough to find it!




