FROM THE OFFICE DOWN THE HALL Gary J. Burdette MMR

"You're darned if you, and darned if you don't." "Six of one and half-a-dozen of another." "You can't see the forest for the trees." I don't know if any or all of these old expressions describe what I've been thinking lately, but I've become aware of a tendency, trend, or approach to modeling which, though not really new, is now more prevalent than in the past. And, I, for one, am cognizant of this change. There may be a subtle, though not intentional, redirecting of our efforts from building to operating. I look it as kit-bashing and scratch-building verses collecting and operating - building vs. R-T-R.

A couple of years ago our Super, Bob Weinheimer presented a clinic on the NMRA's Achievement Program. As we discussed the requirements, we were drawn to the various areas of scratch-building. It was noted that some of the rules and definitions seemed to go back forty years, or so - to the "age of scratch-building" when there were less ready-to-run items than today, especially of our favorite line, and the modeler was forced to fabricate his own replica of a given structure, car, or loco. It is easier to purchase a needed item now than it once was allowing more time to run trains rather than build them.

Recently, Tom Dixon, Founder and Chief Historian of the Chesapeake and Ohio Historical Society, noted that much of the modeling interest has shifted from how-to articles on constructing a specific pieces of C&O equipment to the question "how did they run?" We have seen more general interest in operations over the last thirty years from authors such as McClellan, Chubb, and Koester. Those of us with good memories (old enough to

have been around a while) remember John Allen and Frank Ellison from even earlier times. My favorite line of Ellison's was "Engineer Keeting pulled back on the throttle as he eased his train into town." While all of these gentlemen built models to a fine degree of skill, they all stressed operations. They have been very successful in their efforts, because more and more magazine articles feature operations, and many more modelers are setting up operating sessions instead of just running trains.

I spoke with Steve Summers, from out Louisville way, last week. He had seen a drawing I had made of the C&O C-16, 0-8-0 switchers that were sold to the Virginian and N&W when the C&O brought in diesels from the Pere Marquette for yard work to begin the dieselization process. Our discussion was about the "paint can" device located in front of the smoke stack on a couple of units. He thought I may know what this was, but I hadn't noticed it as the locos I had studied didn't have them, so, I was of no help. This did lead to the topic of detail parts and scratch-building. Maybe, I should say, the lack of available castings was the concern we shared. We voiced some of the same things stated above. We concluded there has been a real shift to operating rather than building. Obviously, the wealth of R-T-R rolling stock and locos is not new the hobby, however, an abundance of ready-built, pre -painted structures is a recent addition to the shelves. The detail parts rack is often half full (half empty?). Is this because "detail hounds" are buying them out or the shop owner is slow to replace them? Am I right? You make the call!

Bruce has been covering a little of the trip in each of his monthly columns instead of firing one "blast" the way I did. I might note that in response to my letter to Amtrak's president; I was contacted by the passenger services department and they offered to "consider" refunding the accommodation charge from our Chicago to Hinton fiasco. I mailed back my ticket stubs over a month ago and have heard nothing since. Oh, well. Now, Bruce is possibly more used to suffering than am I. After all, he is a Santa Fe modeler in a Division which is a hot bed of C&O and B&O modelers. He and I noticed that when we were heading home on the California Zephyr, the train was intercepted by several police officers at Colfax, CA and an individual was taken off the train in handcuffs. Bruce was going to pass the word to Mike Brestel that the man had been arrested for wearing a C&O ball cap. However, as it turned out, the person arrested was the Amtrak coach attendant on one of the coaches on our train. He was wanted on drug charges and the police figured the best way to be sure to catch him was at work.

Speaking of the Santa Fe, I just heard from an old coworker from Long Island. He has recently rebuilt his HO layout after moving to a new home. Mike models the JEROME CENTRAL which is short line which connects with the Santa Fe at the little town of Jerome, AZ. Mike reports that they had to trim the schedule considerably after I moved as they had no one to take the job of yard-master in Jerome, on the new layout. Can't figure that out as many a pleasant evening was spent by me as yardmaster at Jerome. To make a short story long; one of the other operators has decided to give the yardmaster job a shot. MTH "Powhatan Arrow" Cars

Mikes Train House (MTH) has released it's HO scale N&W Powhatan Arrow passenger train set. This is a really nice, reasonably priced, replica of the 1949 version of the Powhatan Arrow train. The cars have the cinder deflectors which were removed at the end of steam operation as well as the "as delivered" full skirts. The cars are lighted and I powered up the DCC and put the observation car on the rail with no result. MTH has equipped the cars with capacitors so it takes a minute for the car lights to come on; but once they are on they will remain on for awhile after the car is removed from the rail. This system will eliminate the "flicker" common in lighted cars. My plan is to one day use cheap DCC decoders to turn on and off the lights in each car. I have an expensive brass imported Powhatan Arrow set of cars and the MTH cars look just fine up against them. Not only that, but the MTH cars have different numbers from the Overland cars! The set consists of a "locker/coach", a "Jim Crow" coach, a 53 seat straight coach, a diner and the wonderful boat tail lounge/observation. The cars have complete interiors. The diner interior is the original 36 seat plan. This was modified to 24 seats with eight lounge chairs and a writing desk after the observation/lounge cars were taken out of service and sold to Saudi Arabia (NOT ON MY RAILROAD!) The interior colors on the prototype varied from car to car and it appears MTH tried to get the observation/lounge right. The other cars are not quite correct, but the overall effect is very pleasing. One last note; I figured on getting a good deal by ordering these cars from Caboose Hobbies in Denver. Well, Chuck has a set at Teays Valley and they are priced well below what I paid. SUPPORT YOUR LOCAL HOBBY STORE! Dan

To the right are photos I took at the NRMA National Convention in Sacramento of winning entries in the model contest. The display of the UP's Cheyenne yard and engine terminal was just fabulous. Buzz Lenander took first place in dioramas with this model as well as second place in the "peoples' choice" photo match category. Meanwhile, Joe Aynar took first place in the "peoples' choice" photo match contest for his model of the FOX Theater in Bakersfield CA. This model also took first place in the judged model scratchbuilt structure category. These were wonderful models which won in competition with other wonderful models.

I would, however, like to make a point here. I have attended the past two MCR Region conventions and would like to say that the modeling I have seen at these conventions would be very competitive on a National level. Just for some examples; think of Dick Briggs diorama of the lake boat with the Hullett unloaders. This is something which would have been very competitive in several categories. Looking at kit class locomotives, I believe Tony Parrish's M&A locomotives could stand shoulder to shoulder with anything I saw at the National. I could go on in this vein in regard to many other categories. The point is not that there is something lacking in the contest models entered at the National level. To begin with, it is not always easy to get models from a distance to enter in the National so in some regards, it is a regional contest. However, I have seen modeling in our Region on a par with what was displayed at Sacramento!

The one thing I did notice was that the documentation on these models was thorough and, no doubt, went a long way towards influencing the judges and the voting public. Whether you like it or not, good documentation will go a long way towards scoring "points" for your modeling. So, enter those models in Division and Region contests! If you can afford to attend a National, don't hesitate to enter your models. Please know that if you are uncomfortable with the required documentation, we will be glad to help in that regard. The documentation is important but the most important thing is YOUR modeling and we would like to see you recognized for it.

We had near perfect weather for the outdoor events. At left is the tent that provided shade as we ate then later for the business meeting. To the right we see the flea market.






We also came to see Mark's layout. His big yard is in the left photo. In the right photo you can see the colored lights that can provide realistic light for night operating sessions.


NEWS FROM NATIONAL NMRA INFONET



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


