From the Office Down the Hall Bob Osburn

As many of you already know, I have been involved with Radio Control Aircraft for many years. My local flying club (The Skyhawks) is sanctioned through the Academy of Model Aeronautics and all Club Members must have current membership with the AMA. This is how we maintain liability insurance for our club activities. Just like the NMRA, a monthly publication is available for members. In a recent issue of the AMA magazine an article caught my eye entitled "Our Industry is Struggling". The author talked about how many small hobby shops have gone out of business, the number of participants and vendors are down at trade shows, and even the number of advertisers in the AMA magazine is fewer. He also noted the number of airplane kits available is at an all-time low; members are opting to purchase almost ready to fly models instead of building from kits or plans.

I share this observation with you because the same things are happening to a certain degree in the model railroad world. Many newbies to model railroading come from a world almost foreign to us old fogies. Their desire is for instant gratification whether buying a first house (must have open concept, walk-in closets, granite counter tops, and stainless steel appliances) or taking this same approach to modeling. Have you noticed how many already built structures, highly detailed rolling stock, preweathered structures and rolling stock, and ready to install accessories (vehicles with working headlights, water tanks

with sound and operating spout, etc.) are now available? I'm not saying this approach is wrong, but it shows a real change in our hobby. Young couples have a lot more on their plate time wise than we had when we were their age. To them they may have the desire to get into model railroading but time seems to be a real factor. Computers and smart phones are a necessity in their lives and it's natural for them to search the web for information and products they desire.

I think we need to be very aware of these changing trends and do some serious thinking on how we can nurture their interest so they can grow into seniors that enjoy model railroading.

We need to be aware the local hobby shop is probably a dying breed. If you have a local hobby shop, please support it. A hobby shop is a great entry point for people to get into our hobby and find out how to connect with others locally who also participate. Its staff is also a great resource for knowledge and assistance.

Tell people about our hobby. Invite them to visit your layout and/or invite them to our monthly meeting. Let them experience the thrill we get out of model railroading and the great comradery we share as a group!

We can all support and be ambassadors of our great hobby.

Meeting adjourned 2:25 p.m.



This is a selection of photos by Jerry Doyle of Chris Broughton's N scale layout. Chris took home a number of contest awards for his steam and diesel locomotives.








