

#### SEPTEMBER EVENT **RUNNING THE CRUSTY ROAD**

Our September will not be a joint event with Division come at 8:00 AM, the other parts of the event start 6 as in past years but we have extended an invitation for their members to attend. As he has for the past several years, Mark Maynard has graciously agreed to host us and to provide lunch and beverages.

A big part of the day is the flea market sale. Bring any of those things you thought you couldn't live without but now realize you don't need. In particular, consider items that you might think too valuable for the raffle. Make sure your name is on it or the packaging, set a price, perhaps do some haggling, and be rid of it. We hope to have somebody to handle the money and bookkeeping but if you make a sale privately, please don't forget to pay the 10% fee due from the seller.

The contest will be photographs so bring those pictures of trains or other railroad subjects, prototype or model, black and white or color.

While those who wish to operate the Crusty are wel-

around 11AM. Lunch will be available around 12:30. The business session will start at 2. While Portsmouth is a long distance for most of us to travel, car pooling can reduce costs and provide lots of good discussions enroute. All we need is a nice day.

Now, for some directions: If you are coming from anywhere but the west, find your way to Portsmouth, OH and leave town headed west on US 52. Look for Brouses Run Road about one half mile after the road narrows from four lanes to two lanes. Turn right onto Brouses Run Road then turn right into the first barn lot. In the past we have used Mark's house as a landmark but now you should turn at the Dollar General store. The model railroad is upstairs in the barn, the other activities will be out behind the barn under the canopies. If you want to use GPS, the house number is 42.

#### FROM THE OFFICE DOWN THE HALL Sam Delauter, Assistant Superintendent

While I have been building HO scale craftsman kits for quite a few years now, it's amazing that sometimes you can overlook something that was probably right there in front of you the whole time. In this case, I discovered Kadee 178 couplers a few months ago. When I was starting working in HO, I realized that I should standardize the brand and type of coupler that I would use. The obvious choice was the Kadee 5. I soon realized that I was starting out not owning much equipment and if I wanted to try to be as close to scale as I could, I should probably go with the Kadee 58. The 58 is the scale version of the 5. Keep in mind there are also the 148 and 158. These are the whisker version of the 5 and 58. Instead of having to add a spring in the coupler box, they have the whisker spring built into the coupler, hence being called whisker couplers.

To start out, I bought a few pairs of both the 58 and the 158. I quickly noticed that both of these couplers could sag in the coupler boxes. I decided to standardize my fleet by choosing the 58 over the 158 whisker. I found that it was easier to get the coupler level in the box with the 58. Opposite of the instructions, I put the spring in the bottom of the box. If there is any sag, I clip the spring wings off of an extra spring or two and use these to shim the coupler to get rid of vertical play. This has kept the couplers flush with the top of the box and given me reliable operation of my fleet.

A few months ago I was building a pair of Funaro and Camerlengo Canadian National reefers. Since I don't know a lot about Canadian railroading, I was doing some research for the build. The author of one of the articles that I read mentioned that he was using Kadee 178 couplers in his build. I had never heard of the 178 so more research was needed. It turns out that the 178 is the scale head 158 whisker coupler in a different coupler box. With the exception of passenger equipment, I had standardized my fleet to use only scale head couplers so this was right up my alley. Soon after I went to West Virginia Hobby and Craft and ordered a couple of packs of 178 to play around with.

After receipt of the couplers, it turned out that these were the couplers that I had been missing the whole time. While they are the 158, it's the box that makes the difference. The boxes that come with the standard types (5, 58 and 148, 158) have some play and let your couplers sag. These 178 seem much better designed as they have next to no space for vertical play. These have recently become my go to couplers. While I am not shaving off molded on coupler boxes, I am using these in every instance that I can. While building kits, whether it's a plastic Intermountain kit or a resin kit, these take the timely process of leveling couplers out of the equation. To make things even easier, the boxes snap together and don't fall apart like the other boxes while being installed. If you spend the amount of time making sure all of your couplers are perfectly level that I do, I think these couplers would serve you well. Most recently when building several Intermountain and Red Caboose kits, the Kadee 5 and 58 were not even something that I considered putting on these kits.

#### CLINICS Sam Delauter, Clinic Chair

At the Picnic on the platform, Dale Osburn presented a clinic on making ground foam. While this can be a messy process, it is not hard and will save a good bit of money if you need a lot of ground foam. Dale gave a great clinic that was both informative and at some points even comedic. Dale's method involved using a blender to make the ground foam. While it often looked like he was making a cocktail for all of us, Dale made it known that we shouldn't drink what we were making.

There will be no clinic at the September meeting, we will be making a visit to Mark Maynard and the Crusty Mountain. Following that we will be having the Mini Clinic Events. It looks like we have enough clinicians for

the October event but will still need a couple for the November Mini Clinic Event. These are a great opportunity to speak on a topic that would not take an entire clinic and also learn a lot in a short time.

#### PASSENGER MANIFEST John Harris, Membership Chair

Back in February, after a 50 year long career, I announced on Facebook and to a few clients that it was my intention to retire from the practice of architecture. That milestone seemed an appropriate end to what has been an extremely rewarding chapter of my life. Still, I had a few projects I was in one stage or another of completion and I would be finishing those through construction completion. The goal was to free up time to allow me to expand our travel itinerary and, of course, to devote more time to my second passion, model railroading. (First passion being spending time with my lovely wife, you might ask.)

Since that time, I have been asked on numerous occasions, "how are you enjoying retirement?" The response quite simple, "it's not working out too well."

In truth, the projects I was committed to finishing have taken a bit longer than expected and two of those clients have expanded scope to include even more work. Some of the construction phase projects are taking longer due to material shortages and delivery delays. I am actually working just as hard as I ever have. But, there is light at the end of the tunnel and I am fairly sure it is not an oncoming train.

The good news is that work has managed to keep the cash flow coming and if nothing else has been bit of a hedge against inflation. The bad news is that the Allegheny & New River Road has set idle, collecting dust, or weathering if you prefer. Virtually no progress has been made since early in the pandemic. In fact, net progress is actually in the nega-

tive and I have ground to recover. Earlier this month one of the new cats we adopted back in December managed to get past the barricades leading into the train area downstairs and managed to take a tour thru the entire layout. In her path was considerable destruction, somewhat reminiscent of a Godzilla movie of the 50s & 60s. I found mass tree displacement, multiple trains derailed, live loads spilled onto right of way, signals toppled, and several buildings shifted from their foundations. I may have to rethink all those live coal loads I use.

In reality, it could have been a whole lot worse! In truth, nothing appears to be broken or permanently damaged and most of the work will be cleaning up the spilled coal and repositioning clumps of foliage. The buildings were loosely placed awaiting final ground cover and the few cars that left the track landed over an embankment into the river below. Thankfully, nothing ended up on the floor. For now, the cats still have a home. Additional countermeasures are in the works.

Surveying the damage, however, did get me thinking how much I miss working on the layout and just plain running trains. It also gave me time to reflect on just how much I need to do. So, it is time to get that "work thing" behind me so I can get back to completing the many projects I have started and those yet to start. I am expecting the winter months to find me back at it.

I hope to see you in Portsmouth. Meanwhile, keep modeling and be safe.

The two background buildings (Allstate Machine Parts and Island Cement Company) demonstrate different methods, products, and wiring techniques for adding lighting to structures with LEDs. The cement plant also has a rotation kiln powered by a miniature gear motor with a device to regulate the low (3.0 VDC) needed for the motor. This plant also has a scratch built street light using telescoping brass tubing and a prewired nano size LED.
