

#### **NMRA ELECTIONS**

Each year around this time the NMRA holds elections for officials at the National level. In some years there are elections that involve each member and in some years it appears to be fairly quiet. This year is in that latter category but for those members of the Coal Division residing in Ohio and Kentucky, it's your time to vote! The Central District Director seat on the NMRA board is up for grabs as the current Central District Director, Bill Neale, is term limited so a new Director must be elected.

In addition to Ohio and Kentucky, this election district includes the states of Minnesota, Iowa, Mississippi, Alabama, Tennessee, Illinois, Wisconsin, Michigan, and Indiana.

The member elected to this position will represent

you but is also expected to keep the best interests of the NMRA as a whole in mind as he or she votes on NMRA issues.

By now you should have received a ballot, either in the mail or a link via email. If the NMRA has your email address, you will receive the electronic ballot link. If not, you will receive a paper ballot. There are two candidates, read their "vote for me" blurbs and make an educated choice. Please vote by the deadline, the results should be available in April.

And, if you are wondering, those of us in West Virginia get our chance next year when the Eastern District Director election takes place.

## FROM THE OFFICE DOWN THE HALL Sam Delauter, Assistant Superintendent

Over the last couple weeks I have been in Nitro during lunchtime. On a handful of those days, I have been able to catch the Kanawha River Railroad (WATCO). While the KNWA operates daily, it can be hard to catch a train. I don't know exactly how many trains pass through daily, but it is not many. The yard in Nitro is small and only has one inhabitant, a GP39-2, number 3902. Other than its duties in the yard, about all of the switching you will see it working is Lehigh Cement and the Potash loading facility. Lehigh Cement sits on a spur off of the yard and they take several hoppers or more per week. If you see any Maryland Midland hoppers in the yard, those belong to Lehigh Cement. A few years back WATCO put installed the potash loader in the yard. Potash is brought across the river from the John Amos Power Plant to load in the yard in Nitro. It strikes me as odd that CSX couldn't work out a deal with them so it must be cheaper to truck it off site. All other online customers for KNWA are some distance from the yard, these customers will be handled on the local. The vast majority of the times that I have been in Nitro, 3902 has been idling or off on the local.

I have also had the chance to catch some of the manifest freights passing through. Typically they make a quick stop in Nitro to pick up a few cars and then head on their way. To me there is something special about seeing SD45s or SD60s moving through the yard to pickup a cut of cars. While the SD60 can still be seen in some places, the SD45 are much rarer. The number of railroads who run these older diesels are much fewer.

If someone were looking for railroad to model, this would be a great one. It is a fairly short run, Columbus, OH to Mullens, WV. The bulk of the railroad is single tracked with several yards. Most of the traffic that is sent on the locals goes to the chemical plants. There are a number of manifests that pass through and a number of coal drags. Because of this traffic, the bulk of the rolling stock that you would need are coal hoppers, tank cars, and two bay covered hoppers. Due to this, your radius on your curves could be keep fairly tight and you could focus on switching operations in the various yards, coal load outs and chemical plants that are online.

On a funny note, much of this clinic was about how to tell where all of the tracks on his layout actually go as the track plan has branches and branches off branches.

The February clinic will be on craftsman kits. I am going to focus on the various types of rolling stock craftsman kits and tips and tricks to build them.

Regardless, this is always a great opportunity for us to represent NMRA at a local event. We will have a presence with our booth display and several T-TRAK modules will be set up to demonstrate member creativity. Brochures, informational handouts, and back issues of the newsletter and NMRA Magazine will be available to promote NMRA membership along with Rail Pass applications. I will be

sheet will be available at the February meeting for volunteers to sit at the table and answer questions and hand out information to interested prospects. These will be for 2 hour segments only so the time commitment is not that large. And before and after you will have plenty of time to take in the show and perhaps drop some coin on the local vendors.

Typically we will see plenty of traffic at these events and answer lots of questions. Most of those attending are more casual railroaders and those that have a "layout" set up under the tree or in a child's bedroom. That is OK, as that is perhaps how most of us were introduced into the hobby. Showing both completed projects in the photos as well as the "how to" diorama gives us an opportunity to engage parents and children alike in a discussion of possibilities. They can see that they too might be able to raise the bar and create a more realistic layout. This too raises questions and provides one more opportunity to engage the public and promote NMRA. Every once and a while, we do get to chat with modelers who were once in the hobby and looking to get back into it. These become the real targets and potential Rail Pass candidates. It is these occasions that give us the best chance of increasing the numbers and expanding out group.


The real reason for going was to attend the NMRA

The T-TRAK layout, a big E shaped arrangement, from opposite corners.


