

As a matter of fact, having it on my computer screen was better than viewing from an in room projection screen. Certainly much sharper images than would have been if in person. 

Leveraging the NMRA website Part 1 Bill Stowe

So full disclosure. Am I an expert on the NMRA website? Heck no. I've used it three times. First to see what was available on what an Assistant Superintendent was supposed to do. Second was to pay my annual dues for 2025. And the third and last time was to begin to explore what the Achievement Program was all about.

Overall I find the website full of information. Having said that, the downside is that it can be a challenge to find exactly what you want. So my first piece of advice would be to plan to take some time to explore it, otherwise frustration can quickly set in. I have yet to explore how effective the site's search engine is.

For this article, I'm going to talk to what I've seen on the Achievement Program. This is of personal interest, not from any desire or belief that I will complete the Achievement Program and qualify as an MMR®. That is as likely as any of you seeing ads for 'Swine Air' flights out of Yeager Airport (in other words, when pigs fly). I see the Achievement Program as a guide to help me grow my skills as a model railroader.

The basics of the Achievement Program, the categories and the requirements by category, are easy to find and easy to walk through. They contain good clear detail on what the expectations are, with links for the forms to support and for further information. For myself, I like that it

shows me areas to explore and challenge my skills that I may not have thought of. Cynthia Priest's articles in the NMRA magazine on her adventure to becoming an MMR® have also being a great motivator for me.

The only area that I would like more information on is the documentation requirements. While it lists what is required, a few examples would be nice. I have heard comments that the documentation requirements are a negative, but I tend to look at this differently. Unlike most of you, I am in the 'steep learning curve' of model railroading. So the documentation portion I view as a great way to capture my learnings on what did and didn't work on various topics.

The final challenging area, to my mind, is the requirement to have some models earned a score of a least 87.5 points in a NMRA sponsored contest or AP Merit Award evaluation. My first reaction to the contest at this past summer's regional conference would say the NMRA sponsored contest is very challenging. I'm not sure exactly what is entailed by the AP Merit Award evaluation, I need to talk to our MMR®s about this.

I look forward to Bob's clinic in March. I encourage you to take a moment to look at the material on the website to come up with some great questions for Bob!



Scale Trains announced a new series of SD9 and SD7 locomotives. At the NMRA booth the 90th anniversary celebration started. We were right across the aisle from Soundtraxx who were celebrating their 35th anniversary. In another building Lionel was celebrating their 125th anniversary. This year seems to be a big year for round number anniversaries in the industry.


In his article about the NMRA website, Bill Stowe focused on the Achievement Program. At the its meeting Friday, the NMRA Board of Directors approved a change to the Model Railroad Author certificate. More types of self published information are now permitted although material not subject to editorial review is still limited to half the points required to earn the certificate. Also, the number of words that define a page was reduced from 1200 to 800. The Board of Directors also approved a large number of standards that mostly related to Layout Command Control.

As the meeting closed, Atlantic District Director Mike Arnold was named an Honorary Life Member, the NMRA's highest honor. Mike has a long history of service to the NMRA from his roles in the British Region to the National Organization. This was a well deserved honor.









Under Construction
