Upcoming Meetings

The March Coal Division meeting was once again held at the St. Albans Historical Society building. The contest at the meeting was "Locomotives Other Than Steam". While the prior months contest was steam locos, the non-steam contest tends to see as many if not more entries. While these locos can take a lot of work to build, this can seem less daunting to many people. The contest once again had a number of good entries. Some of these may have a good shot to gain a merit evaluation. This may help some of our members move one step closer to their MMR[®]. With that said, our clinic for March was by Bob Weinheimer with help from our other MMR[®]s Randy Allio and Don Cipolla. While this is a recurring clinic every few years, it is always good to see Bob present it to bring attention to the Achievement Program. There may be low hanging fruit for a lot of these certificates for many of our members.

This month the clinic will be our "Mini Clinic Event". Randy has been working to line up a number of good mini clinics for us. These are short clinics, 10-15 minutes long each. We typically have 3-5 clinics scheduled. This is a great opportunity for us to learn quite a bit about several different topics in a short period of time. These have been very popular in the past and I expect this time to be no different.



FROM THE OFFICE DOWN THE HALL Bill Stowe, Assistant Superintendent

I enjoyed Bob's presentation last month on the NMRA Achievement Program, as it helped my ongoing learning on what the program is about and how to participate in it. I have come to the opinion that many of us (myself included) are aspiring MMR®s in the way we approach model railroading. By that I mean we aspire to the Achievement Program levels in the areas that interest us, but choose not to go through all the facets on the program to achieve MMR® status. So I believe knowledge of the program helps us all, even if we are not active participants.

I have continued my exploration of the NMRA website. I have begun to play with the site's search engine to understand how it can help find the information available on the site.

First, and most important, you do need to sign in to get the full value of the search engine. It does work without signing in, but the responses do not reflect what is in the members only part of the site.

The search engine strikes me as an older version. By that I mean it does not seem to incorporate some of the advanced features of today's search engines which allow you to refine searches easily. The NMRA search engine works well, but can provide an overwhelming response of hits. I have yet to try how to refine the search through using italics, etc.

Having said that, with a little patience and exploring, I find it interesting what you can find.

I have searched for information on topics like software systems (JMRI) and DCC systems. A lot of information is available on the NMRA site, but I would suggest the following for your searches. The NMRA site contains a lot of information on how people use the different products on the layouts. However, if you are looking for specific technical information then the you are probably better off to go directly to the provider sites.

I searched for 'yard design', and it led me to Legacy NMRA Data Sheets. While probably not of interest to many of you, it was a little gold mine for me. The Data sheets are short, focused education sheets on many topics related to model railroading, which is of value to me as I strive to continue to ground myself in the basics of model railroading. Prior to joining NMRA I bought several 'How to' books on model railroading. My initial reaction is that the Data Sheets, along with the clinics at our monthly meetings, are far more value (to me) than the books I bought.

More to come as I continue to explore the site.


Kanawha Valley Railroad Association By Monica Horter






Under Construction
