

FROM THE OFFICE DOWN THE HALL Bill Stowe, Assistant Superintendent

As I mentioned in last month's newsletter, for this month I was going to talk about the video library and some options for the future.

So let's start by refreshing everyone on what is in the video library. Contents are approximately as follows:

- 31 DVD's on a 'Dream, Plan, Build' series from Model Railroader
- 5 DVD's that I would categorize as railfan or historical of actual railroads
- 9 DVD's of layout tours
- 3 DVD's called 'Railroad Chronicles'
- 88 DVD's that are videos of presentations from NMRA conventions

All except the DVD's from the NMRA conventions are in a hard plastic cover. The NMRA DVD's are simply in a paper envelope.

I did touch base with Bob Weinheimer on whether the NMRA DVD's should be considered 'proprietary' (ie. For NMRA member use only), he did not see this as an issue. Age of these DVD's start within 1995, and end in 2006. Bill Wadsworth did have all these DVD's cataloged, I will bring copies of this to the meeting.

So my thoughts on options for the future of the video library (read 'or' between each option).

- We can simply continue as we have done, if someone is interested in taking over from Bill Wadsworth.
- Have a 'free for all' give away to Division 9 NMRA members.
- Donate the 'Dream, Plan, Build' series to a local public library to try to encourage people that are interested in getting into the hobby. Balance of the DVD's in plastic cases either donate or give to members. NMRA series to be open to members (as without hard cases I do not think they would be acceptable to a public library).
- Try to sell/raffle DVD's for a little cash for the group.

I have not contacted any public library as to interest (or if they still loan out DVD's). I wanted to have the discussion with the division first.

For the meeting, I will bring the box with the 'library' in it for those who want to look at the DVD's, and will look to have a short discussion during the meeting to get input on folk's thoughts.

I was not happy to have missed the usual fun at Mark's place but circumstances make it impossible.

When last I updated you on the NMRA branding project, the prospect of keeping our Division logo seemed dim. Well, there has been lots of feedback on that and now they may survive although they will be subject to style and color choices. One possibility is to have the NMRA logo on one lapel of a shirt with the Division logo on the other, let's see how that works out. Region logos are history. The first things to change will be the NMRA Magazine, the website, and social media. Other items will be more gradual but you should see those electronic items first. We will receive artwork and the like to get us set up on our newsletter and web site. I can't say more now but look for the November E-Bulletin for more details.

Another big project is Vision 2035 or where we want to be when the NMRA reaches its 100th birthday. You may be receiving a very brief member survey in the next couple of weeks. Please fill it out, it won't take very long

at all. It will for a baseline of opinion that will be used as a yardstick of member satisfaction. Similar but longer surveys will be aimed at Region Presidents and Division Superintendents throughout the NMRA.

At our June meeting I presented a program on documenting your holdings. I mentioned a piece of software I liked but got away from as the creator was in poor health. Since then he has passed away but his widow wants to see it continue. Model Railroad Hobbyist, the free digital magazine published by Joe Fugate, has worked with her to make this happen and it will be free. This software not only helps you document your collection but it can also be used to prepare waybills and more. To download the software, you need to be a member of the MRH Forum which, I think, requires a subscription to the magazine. The magazine is free so this is not a big limitation. Learn more here. On this page you will also see something about another publication called Running Extra. That is not free but it's not very expensive.

T-TRAK Herb Parsons, T-TRAK Chair

I attended the Mike Phillips N Scale Weekend in Altoona, PA. sponsored by the Altoona Association of Model Railroaders September 20 & 21. I took 3 modules and set up with the combined T-TRAK layout. The combined layout consisted of 102 individual modules, 184 single equivalent modules, making 198 feet of double track mainline making an estimated 6 scale miles in a layout that was 40'X27'.

The Iron City N Scalers T-TRAK was twice the size of last years with new modules and new members participating. there were also T-TRAK layouts from other groups and individuals. One group came down from Ontario, Canada.

There were N Trak layouts from Huntington, WV's

AMRS, Lynchburg, VA, Baltimore, MD and Twin Tiers. Freemo N setup in a separate room and received a lot of attention.

Thirty vendors had tables and were selling new and used N Scale rolling stock, locomotives and buildings. Yankee Dabbler, Atlas, Scale trains, Mudd Creek Models, Rail Scale Models and more.

As a reminder, The AMRS Model Railroad Show is coming up in November, and it is time to get our modules ready. Let me know if you will be available to setup your T-TRAK module and the size of each so that I can let the AMRS know how much room we will need.

I am sure he thoroughly enjoyed it and is looking forward to other operating opportunities. It is great to see someone getting out of their comfort zone and expanding their skills. As I have said before, I believe one of the great benefits to membership in NMRA is to expend our skill sets and try something new.

With the distribution of this year's Gary Burdette Challenge kit, we have one more opportunity to try something new. While I have done several laser cut craftsman kits in the past, these ITLA kits look a bit different. I am guessing that there are several who have not done one of these in the past so it is another chance to try something new. And, the kit can be assembled in several configurations so it will be interesting to see how many variations we will have come December.

Personally, I am beginning to look into the possibility of making an Amtrak Trek across the country next spring. While I have traveled to New Mexico on the Southwest Chief several years ago, I have never planned something quite so ambitious. So much so that my usual travel companion, the wife, suggest I am free to take this trek on my own. The plan is to take the Cardinal to Chicago, then California Zephyr west to Sacramento, with a stop perhaps in Denver. From there I will be taking the Coast Starlight to Seattle with a day or two side trip to Crater Lake and Redwoods National parks. Return will be via the Empire Builder stopping off at East Glacier before returning to Chicago, then CHW. All together this will take 2 weeks. It's a little aggressive perhaps so I understand my wife's reluctance to set out on such a trek, particularly since I am planning to do this all in coach! Planned stops are scheduled both for sightseeing and overnight motel stays to freshen-up.


I am curious if anyone has undertaken such at trip or has traveled on any part of these trains. I welcome any feedback as this is in the initial planning stages and subject to change. I have plenty of time to iron out the details but for now, this seems doable. Amtrak's rail pass allows 10 legs of travel with-in a 30 day window, all for \$499. This works out to be 9 such legs so I have room for one more stop off somewhere along the way. I have included a map showing the proposed itinerary.

I will be traveling to Florida for the entire month of October for our annual pilgrimage so I will be joining you remotely for the next meeting. Plans are to return the 3rd of November so I should be able to join you in person for the November meeting. That said the Passenger Manifest may be missing from the next "Up the Holler". Regardless, keep modeling and I hope to see you soon.








Under Construction
